Ruling on request to place proceeding into abeyance

1. On August 18, 2025, Enerfin Energy Company of Canada Inc. (EECCI) filed a letter requesting that the Alberta Utilities Commission place this proceeding into abeyance until September 23, 2025, and to suspend all associated deadlines accordingly.¹
2. In its letter, EECCI explained that it recently became aware that the battery energy storage system (BESS) it used in the preliminary design is no longer available for procurement and EECCI will need to use a different BESS, which will require an updated noise impact assessment and air quality assessment. EECCI stated that it may also need to make layout changes to incorporate the new BESS model into the design.
3. The Commission has instructed the writer to communicate the following.
4. The Commission finds that granting EECCI's request to place the proceeding into abeyance is reasonable in the circumstances and is satisfied that providing EECCI the time to amend and supplement its applications will contribute to the fair, expeditious and efficient resolution of the issues in this proceeding. Consequently, the Commission grants EECCI's request and places this proceeding into abeyance effective immediately.
5. The Commission directs EECCI to provide an update on the status of the applications by September 23, 2025.
6. Given the granting of EECCI's request for abeyance, the existing process schedule is suspended until further direction is provided by the Commission.
7. The Commission will establish a new process schedule after the proceeding is taken out of abeyance.
